A Note From Our President & CEO

UNITED WAY OF SAGINAW COUNTY

I am excited to deliver our 2021 Annual Report of the United Way of Saginaw County. I am very proud of the impactful, life-saving, truly life-changing work we have provided to the community as an agency and as a collaborative partner. When you consider our traditional role and focused work in the community and recognize the impact the past few years have made for Saginaw County through this work it is extraordinary. In a time of socioeconomic disparities and social disruptions, we were there! We are not only making transactional grants, supporting others' work, we transform lives. We are building nonprofit community collaborations and collective action to work together in a "united way." These investments, collaborations, administration and the direct assistance provided in 2021 by United Way of Saginaw County of over 14 million dollars has helped to support and change the direction for so many in our community.

At our core, we are a charitable fundraising agent, dependent on the scores of companies large and small, and many individuals like you - the funders - to support our grant-making to a community of high-performing nonprofits. COVID has irrevocably changed the way our United Way does business, in many ways for the better.

The ability to connect with our donors forced new technologies and increased our need to shift to virtual formats of communication and interaction. When the impact of COVID consumed our community and scores of individuals were pushed over the edge into situational poverty - our United Way was able to pivot and respond immediately. We provided 12.5 million dollars of direct assistance in 8 months to over 8,000 households. We leveraged the generosity of our community and provided support so no tummy would go empty by addressing emergency food insecurities. We recognized gaps in learning and the challenges educators faced by awarding 112 educators with mini-grants. We collaborated with 9 regional partners, providing funding to 200 nonprofit partners to increase their capacity. We restored families by providing flood recovery to households that were destroyed by the lingering effects of the regional flood. Our commitment to supporting localized nonprofit work continued, despite the challenges raging all around us. We emerged stronger, weathered, and ready to serve on a moment's notice.

It has been such a tough year for so many in our community, and for so many nonprofits on the front lines addressing the unprecedented need and yet our community reported the lowest unmet needs in the history of United Way's funding of 2-1-1 for Saginaw County. The unduplicated role of the United Way is essential these days more than ever. As we serve the highest unmet need we were there to satisfy the growing, emergent needs of our friends, neighbors, and nonprofit partners.

Thank you for appreciating, supporting, and donating so that everyone in our community can thrive.



IMAGINATION LIBRARY

Parents with children who are between the ages of birth and age 5 can register to receive a children's book in the mail every month at no cost, all provided by our investment. Current annual investment into Saginaw County children is \$50,000

PROJECT INDEPENDENCE

Annually, our partners in labor proudly provide construction, materials and direction in collaboration with local businesses and volunteer networks to forever impact mobility and access to our community for those that are homebound

\$87,200

LEXIA LEARNING

Lexia provides personalized online learning of critical reading and language skills with real-time data. We support several non-profit agency programs through this investment along with many local Saginaw County classrooms in Frankenmuth, Bridgeport, and Saginaw Township

CATCHAFIRE, CAPACITY BUILDING

United Way of Saginaw County in partnership with other local and regional funders in the Great Lakes Bay Region, provided support to 200 non-profit partners and school districts. Through this partnership, invited nonprofits will have access to experts from across the country who volunteer their services to support operations with capacity building together.

COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

\$50,000

was awarded to educators throughout Saginaw County providing grant awards for tools, supplies, field trips and equipment to enhance their classorooms.

EDUCATOR MINI GRANT

It was a happy holiday for 112 educators representing over 42 Saginaw County schools when United Way of Saginaw County offered an open call to apply for mini-grant awards ranging up to \$500 per classroom. We are so proud of the work our educators are doing!

304,274 lbs

of non-perishable food was provided to the community to address food insecurities.

This is one of our community's highest needs.

FOOD INSECURITIES SUPPORT

We provided support directly through food box distributions, joined statewide incentives such as Summer Stock Up, partnered with countless companies and directly supported Hidden Harvest in their work to provide food to local pantries.

FEMA - EFSP - EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER

United Way of Saginaw County is a conduit to provide FEMA funding to 10 agencies addressing critical supportive services to the community through funding provided to support utilities, food and stable housing. Saginaw County Youth Protection Services, Underground Railroad, Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, First Ward Community Center, Saginaw County Community Action Center, Hidden Harvest, City Rescue Mission, Salvation Army and East Side Soup Kitchen all receive funding through this program.

\$202,865

In Phase 38 United Way of Saginaw County brought into the community financial awards to provide funding to non-profit organizations that provide relief and support to our community members.

HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

United Way of Saginaw County serves as the HARA and LEAD agency supporting community partnerships with the Saginaw Consortium of Homeless Assistance Providers, providing critical funding to 5 local shelters and by housing the Continuum of Care Coordination and the HMIS Administration.

HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION WITH THE CONTINUUM OF CARE

Through our work as the HARA (housing assistance resource agency) in partnership with 5 local homeless shelters, we serve as a fiduciary and gatekeeper for critical funding provided to our community. Through the work of Project Home and HMIS System Administration critical funding is provided for housing prevention and rapid re-housing from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA), the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the City of Saginaw. These dollars have made it possible to provide short-term assistance to prevent homelessness and quickly re-house people who have become homeless.

\$12,522,257

reinvested into Saginaw & Tuscola County in households providing financial support for rent, utilities (water, electricity, trash, sewer) and internet and providing financial support to those businesses that provide affordable housing to our community.

\$110,919

helped families avoid water shut-off due to non-payment.

\$23,563

provided an safe alternative to homelessness for 374 days. This served 67 individuals from 28 households.

CERA PROGRAM COVID EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE

the addition of 16 amazing Case Managers working for United Way provided significant support to the community in ensuring our community's most vulnerable members remained stably housed & provided support to the landlords who are business owners and rely on the income from their businesses to support their families.

CITY HOMEOWNER WATER ASSISTANCE

In partnership with the City of Saginaw, we were able to provide financial support in assisting with water bill payments to avoid homeowner shut-offs.

DIRECT ASSISTANCE - HOTEL VOUCHERS

Supported through MSHDA and Salvation Army we are able to provide hotel assistance in the event that shelter space is not an available option

VOLUNTEERS

VITA - VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE PROGRAM


The VITA program in Saginaw County provides tax return preparation at no cost to the filer. This program has been serving our community for decades and is completely facilitated by generous volunteers.
